Title 1 : Reading Program: The Title I Reading Program has a FT Reading Teacher and a full day instructional support staff. Students are selected in several ways: Teacher recommendation, Parent request, Student Study Team (SST) recommendation, and/or Dynamic Indicators of Basic Early Literacy Skills (DIBELS) assessment. Students are tested about every two weeks using the Progress Monitoring assessment. The DIBELS Benchmark is also used three times a year for assessments.

Our band invites community to experience an evening of music three times a year. 4th grade classes present drama skits to parents at the end of each year. Our parent club is growing and very involved in raising funds to support our field trip requests.

B. Well-Rounded Education

We have a primary music program that allows for each TK-4th grade class to receive music instruction for 30 minutes one time each week. This program has a music teacher who is supported by the classroom teacher during each session. Monies will be spent to pay for music instruction and materials.

C. Safe and Healthy Students

We were able to provide extensive training this past summer to one of our teaching staff. She was trained in trauma based art education and will be presenting and sharing her insight with our students and staff. Materials and inservice needs will require money to support.

D. Effective Use of Technology

We will be purchasing software for 7-8 grade ELA teacher to support/check student work for plagiarism. We also would like to put in place a safety software that enables each teacher to monitor all sites that a student is working with.

The use of Title 4 funds were discussed and reviewed during our LCAP strategic planning sessions in Spring of 2019. Funds will be used for music instruction, trauma based art instruction and supplies and well as software support.
